
City Mayor's Welcome Letter for Classic Car Convention June 9-12, 2016

Of course, it was the Model "A" that made those vacation trips a reality for many. Enter the era of the "Motor Park," precurser to our modern-day RV parks. To host this annual event is itself a great honor for our community, but it is also, for Glen Rose, a reunion of sorts. It is a reunion of old friends—historic structures and locations with historic machines. These old, familiar friends will join together as you travel through parts of our town and county, bringing to life once again the days of yester-year to be enjoyed by the residents of the present.

On behalf of the community of Glen Rose, I extend to you a warm, hardy Glen Rose welcome and heartfelt thank you for the honor.

Glen Rose is a city in and the county seat of Somervell County. The area was first settled in 1849 by Charles Barnard, who opened a trading post near Comanche Peak. After the region became a federal Indian reservation in 1855, Barnard moved his business to Fort Belknap. Circa 1859 when the reservation was abolished, he returned to the area and built the first store on what is now the site of Glen Rose.


A three-story stone gristmill was constructed along the Paluxy River and the town that grew up around it became known as Barnard's Mill. The mill was sold to T.C. Jordan of Dallas in 1871 for \$65,000. Jordan's wife, a native of Scotland, decided to rename the town Rose Glen to reflect the area's natural surroundings. The citizens later voted to call the community Glen Rose. A post office opened in 1874.

When Somervell County was formed on March 15, 1875, Glen Rose was designated as its county seat. A Baptist college was organized in 1879 and was later sold to the Paluxy Baptist Association. In 1889, the northern Presbyterians opened Glen Rose Collegiate Institute (also known as Glen Rose College), which remained in operation for the next 15 to 20 years. A courthouse around Glen Rose's town square was completed around 1892, but burned down a year later. A newly built Romanesque Revival style courthouse was constructed soon after with locally quarried limestone. That building sustained damage in a 1902 tornado that also damaged part of the town square.

Throughout the period from the 1900s to the 1920s, Glen Rose was home to approximately 1,000 people. The area's mineral springs attracted numerous doctors and self-styled healers to the community. During Prohibition, the area was a center of moonshining and Glen Rose became known as the "whiskey woods capital of the state." The population remained steady during the Great Depression, although unemployment rates in both Glen Rose and Somervell County increased. As part of the New Deal, Glen Rose borrowed \$80,000 under the Public Works Administration (PWA) to construct a new water and sewage system. Three low-water dams on the Paluxy River, several local school buildings, and a canning plant were built with Works Projects Administration (WPA) money.

During the post-war years, the population of Somervell County declined from 3,071 in 1940 to 2,542 in 1950 as many residents moved in search of greater employment opportunities. At the same time, Glen Rose grew from 1,050 residents in 1940 to 1,248 in 1950. The construction of the Comanche Peak Nuclear Power Plant in the mid-1970s brought financial advantages and new residents to the Glen Rose area. The city experienced a 34 percent increase in population between 1970 and 1980. The nuclear plant came to dominate the local economy. Other chief industries include farming, ranching, and tourism. 111 rated businesses were located in Glen Rose as of 1991. By 2000, the population of the city had grown to 2,122 and the total number of rated businesses rose to 224.

Things to Know about the Expo Center

- Park in the Front Parking Lot for Registration, Raffle Tables, Seminars, Fashion Judging and the Grand Tour on Saturday.
- **Trailer Parking** is located in the front area of the Front Parking Lot.
- Park in the **Arena Parking Lot** lot for the Welcome Party, Bingo Party and Awards Banquet, especially if you have mobility issues. The Arena is at ground level on the that side. There are entry doors and handicapped parking. The Arena is sunken and is accessible only by bleacher stairs on the west side.
- Restrooms are located on both levels.
- The Repair Tent is located under the cover of the barn roof in the back of the Arena building, so it will be out of the weather, cool and dry.
- For car judging, Model A's will enter the Arena past the Repair Tent in the back of the building. They will be judged on the packed earth of the Arena floor.
- This is a casual, small-town venue, used mainly for rodeo and livestock events. The Arena floor is hard-packed, red-colored *earth*. Wear appropriate shoes for this surface, as they may get a little dusty. Light-colored shoes and pants may discolor.
- There is a common area with a gift shop that will be shared with a group who is utilizing other areas of the Expo Center. The gift shop is on the west side of the arena, on the same level as registration, raffles, and other activities. For banquets, it is up the bleacher stairs from the arena. If you have mobility issues, there is a ramp on the east side of the building that goes up to the that level. Be advised that it does require a little walking. There is a miniature horse show going on during the time we are here but it shouldn't interefere with our activities.

HUBLEY RULES

The Track:

- Three lanes wide
- Forty feet long
- Manual car launching
- Timing lights

The Cars:

- The cars must be metal 1:20 scale models made by Hubley, Gabriel, and Scale Model.
 Any of the seven Model "A" body styles may be used: Sedan, Station Wagon, Coupe, Roadster, Roadster Pickup, Victoria, and Phaeton.
- Cars must be stock including the original tires, wheels, and axle screws. No modifications allowed.
 Steering may be secured or loose at maker's choice.
- Weight of each car can be no more than 1 pound, 5 ounces (station wagon weight). A small amount of leeway will be allowed due to the differences of scales. Weights added to lighter cars must be secured, not loose in car.
- A dry lubricant (graphite for example) is allowed at owner's choice.

Three Classes:

Youth Class: 0–16 year olds Adult Class:17 and over

The Race:

After the cars are checked in, all handling and racing of the cars is done by race personnel. At the time their cars are being raced, the competitors may be called up to the track. Cars from each class will be pitted against each other in random order to determine Class Champion, Second and Third Place winners in that class. In the final event, the three Class Champions race to determine the Overall Winner. Three awards are presented in each class. Before the races begin, look over the cars and pick your favorite. Write the car's number on a slip of paper and deposit it in the ballot box. The winner will be announced at the end of the races.





TOUR ETIQUETTE GUIDE

- Model A's should stay in order in their own group, with no passing.
- Cars should not scatter out, but leave about five car lengths between cars so that on twolane roads they can be safely passed by modern cars not in the group. Don't follow too closely and don't lag too far behind.
- As the tour is in progress, some cars in your group may be left behind at traffic lights or stop signs. Wait for the car behind you to make it through the light or turn before you continue. If you need to slow down or stop for the car behind you, please flash your lights at the car in front of you. They shoud be
- paying attention and slow down or stop and wait for you so that the group can stay together. Always keep an eye on the car behind you!
- Pull over as far to the right as possible if traffic should get backed up behind us. The last car in line will determine when to pull over and let traffic go through. If you see a car behind you pull over and its headlights are not on, you will know it is pulling over for traffic, and not for a problem.
- In case you do have car trouble, turn on your headlights and pull over in a safe spot if possible. The cars behind you will continue

- on. The "sweeper trailer" will follow our route and stop if you are having car trouble.
- Cell phone service will be spotty.
 Text messages are usually more
 reliable, but receiving texts may
 be delayed.
- On highways, hazard flashers are good to use if the Model A's are going uphill or slow.
- Modern cars should be in the last group and follow behind the Model A's.
- After our lunch on the Grand Tour in Meridian, you may return to Glen Rose on your own.

GUIDED TOURS THIS AFTERNOON!


Join us for all three points of interest or join us at any point on your own. We will leave the Expo Center at 12:45 and tour Comanche Peak, which is on our way to the windmill farm. We will finish off the afternoon at the vineyard, where you can sit on the porch and relax and enjoy the view before we head back to town.

Comanche Peak Nuclear Power Plant

The Visitors Center is about a mile inside the front gate. There are interactive displays and a 10-minute video explaining how nuclear power is made. The tour includes a view of a control room simulator in which reactor operators are trained. We have made reservations for today at 1:00. We will leave the Expo Center parking lot at 12:45 as a group, traveling north on FM 56.

Windmill Farm in Tolar

We'll see more than 40 windmills representative of actual windmills used in this part of Texas. Each has been restored to original condition and functions as designed. Some are always in operation. New ones are being added as they are restored. We may see restorations in progress. Great photo opportunities! We will leave the visitor center at 2:00. If you want to put the location in your GPS, it's at 6625 Colony Road, Tolar, Texas 76476. (This is also a bed and breakfast.) Then, we're off to visit a winery.



Bluff Dale Vineyards

Sit on the porch overlooking the beautiful vineyards and hill country of Bluff Dale. They have earned First Place in the prestigious Tasters Choice consumers' wine competition held in Texas, as well as First and Third Place at Grapefest in Grapevine in 2012. Wine tastings are available, as well as soft drinks and light snacks. Beautiful views. In your GPS, it's at 5222 Co Rd 148, Bluff Dale, TX 76433. We should be back to the hotel around 5:00.



ON YOUR OWN

If windmills and wineries aren't on your agenda today, there are several self-guided tours and points of interest to choose from. Additionally, there are plenty of places to shop and eat, both on the square and on the main road through town. See the inside back cover of this guide for a map and ideas.

Guided tour to Comanche Peak, Windmill Farm & Bluff Dale Vinyards Driving Directions

Be in the Expo Center parking lot at 12:45. Leave at 1:00 pm.

To Comanche Peak

Turn left out of parking lot onto Bo Gibbs.

Turn right onto Hwy 67; go 1.4 mi to the traffic light.

Turn right onto Hwy 56; go 5.0 miles.

Turn right at traffic light onto Comanche Peak grounds. *Watch for deer!* Go 0.7 mi.

Visitors Center will be 2nd white building on the right. Park in front lot. We will stay about 45 minutes. Restrooms available.

Drive approx. 10 minutes; 7.1 miles.

To Windmill Farm

Turn left out of parking lot and go back to traffic light, 0.7 mi.

Turn right onto Hwy 56 North; go 5.0 mi.

Turn left onto Hwy 51; go 0.5 mi.

Turn right and you will be back onto Hwy 56 North; go 5.0 miles (toward Tolar).

Turn left onto Hwy 377 at the caution light in Tolar. (There is a Chevron gas station at

the intersection.) Go a couple of blocks.

Turn right and you will be back onto Hwy 56 North again; go 1.3 mi.

Turn right onto Colony Rd; go 3.0 mi.

Main entrance to Windmill Farm will be on the right.

Drive approx. 20 minutes; 15 miles.

To Bluff Dale Vinyards

We will leave Windmill Farm through the back gate on Colony Rd. and re-trace our route back to Hwy. 56

Turn left onto Colony Rd.; go 2.9 mi.

Turn left at the "T" onto Hwy 56 South; go 1.3 mi.

Turn right onto Hwy 377 West; go 6.4 mi. toward Bluff Dale.

Turn right onto CR 148; go 2.5 mi.

Winery will be on right.

Spirits, sodas and water available for purchase. Restrooms are available. Nice covered patio with view.

Drive approx. 20 minutes; 13.1 miles.

Optional Route to Bluff Dale Vinyards

This route involves traveling on a gravel road for 4 miles, but is quite scenic.

Leave Windmill Farm through back gate.

Turn left onto Colony Rd; go 2.9 mi.

Turn *right* at the "T" onto Hwy 56 North.

Hwy 56 North becomes CR 108.

CR 108 comes to a "T".

Turn left onto Bluff Dale Rd. (The first 1.8 miles will be paved. It will be gravel for 4 miles and then paved again.

The winery will be on the left.

Drive approx 30 minutes; 13.1 miles.

Back to Glen Rose

We will re-trace our route back to the Expo Center.

Turn left from the winery gate; go 2.5 mi.


Turn left onto Hwy 377 East; go 6.5 mi to caution light in Tolar.

Turn right onto Hwy. 56 South; go 5.0 mi.

Turn left onto Hwy 51; go 0.5 mi.

Turn right onto Hwy 56 South; go 5.0 mi toward Glen Rose.

Drive approx 35 minutes; 20.9 miles.

"A" MORNING OF JUDGING! Car Judging

Head over to the Expo Center. You will drive your car into the arena for judging. Go around the east side of the building and enter the arena near the repair tent. If you are entering your car to be judged, you will help with the judging, too. George Tynan is our Chief Judge. We will be using the MAFCA Judging Standards. Judges will meet for breakfast at the Expo Center Showroom Office 8:00 to 9:00.

Fashion Judging

Judging is held at the Expo Center. Arrive at the waiting room at least 15 minutes before your assigned time. Don't be nervous! This is supposed to be fun! You will be judged by the panel and have your photo taken. We will be using the MAFCA Fashion Judging Stantards. Kim Eddy is our chair and will also judge. Lynda Davis is our Chief Judge. Judges will meet for breakfast at the Expo Center Showroom Office from 8:00 to 9:00.

GUIDED TOUR TO HICO THIS MORNING

Guided Tour to Hico Driving Directions

Leave Expo Center parking lot at 9:30 am.

Turn Left on Bo Gibbs from the Expo Center parking lot. Turn Right on Hwy 67.

Turn left onto Hwy 144/Barnard Street (first road to the left).

Turn left onto Hwy 144 South (just past the courthouse).

Travel on Hwy 144 South 12.4 miles to Walnut Springs.

Turn right onto FM 927 West. Go 8.9 miles.

Turn left onto Eastland St. in Iredell. Go 0.6 miles.

Turn Right onto TX Hwy 6 North. Go 10.2 miles to Hico.


Drive approx. 45 minutes; 33.8 miles.




AWARDS & FASHION BANQUET



Turn right onto **Texas Drive**.

Texas Drive becomes CR 301.

Turn right on **CR 301A**. Go 2.3 mi. (If you see the entrance to Wheeler Branch Park, you've gone too far.)

CR 301A becomes **CR 313** after the curve. Go 1.4 miles on CR 301A/ CR 313.

Turn left on **CR 326**. Go .4 miles.

Turn left on CR 318. Go .8 miles.

Turn right (north) at the stop sign onto **FM 56**. Go .5 miles.

Turn left (west) onto **CR 1007**. (Post Oak Church will be on your right.) Go 3.8 miles on CR 1007.

Turn right onto **CR 1008** at the "T" (There is a low water crossing to your left, which dead ends. Good swimming/fishing hole.)

There will be an emergency portable potty on CR 1008.

CR 1008 becomes **CR 220/Edwards Rd.** Go 5 miles on CR 1008/CR 220.

Turn left on **Hwy. 51** at the stop sign.

Immediately turn right (west) onto **CR 168/Bakers Crossing Rd.** Go 4.1 miles.

Turn left (south) on CR 2870. go 1.5 miles.

Turn left (east) again onto **FM 205** at the stop sign. Go 3.3 miles.

2. Dur first designated potty break is at the intersection of FM 205 and FM 51, about 24 miles from the Expo Center. Draw your second poker card(s) and grab some water before continuing on your way.

Heading out, you will turn right or south on Hwy 51 toward Paluxy. Go 7.1 miles.

Turn right onto **CR 1006** (Chalk Mountain Bypass Rd.) at the stop sign. Go 1.4 miles. We will make a short pause to regroup.

Turn right onto **Hwy 67**. Go 1 mile.

Turn left (south) onto **CR 198**. (There will be a cell phone tower on the right and a Masonic Logde sign on the left.)

CR 105 becomes **CR 2015**. We will be going 7.5 miles on CR 198/ CR 105/CR 2015. (Hang in there!)


Turn left (north) at the stop sign onto **CR 2013**. Go .2 miles.

➤ There will be a single portable potty at the end of CR 2012 right before you turn onto CR 203.

Turn right (south) at the stop sign onto **FM 203**. Follow FM 203 to Hwy 144.

Turn right (south) at the stop sign onto **FM 203**. Follow FM 203 to Hwy 144.

Turn right onto **Hwy 144**, traveling through Walnut Springs.

3. We ill stop briefly at Walnut Springs City Park on Hwy 144. It's on the left just past town. You will draw your third poker card(s) here. Meridian is just 12 miles south on Hwy 144.

Continue south on Hwy 144 to Meridian.

- **4.** Din Meridian you will be served lunch at the Meridian Civic Center at 309 W. River Street. Draw your fourth poker card(s) here. The town is opening up the Bosque Collection Museum and the courthouse especially for us. Enjoy these, some shopping and the Bosquefest taking place here today.










HOW TO DRIVE YOUR MODEL A


Back in the Model A Era many women drove their cars on errands and to and from afternoon gatherings. Many automobile advertisements showed women driving the Model A. Ladies should not be intimidated about driving the Model A.

Starting Your Model A

- Make sure **Parking Brake** is on (pulled towards you) Note: with earlier models, parking brake is on the left-hand side of driver.
- Turn on the Gas (lever pointed down). Note: with later models (after April of 1931) the gas shut-off will probably be under the hood.
- 3. Retard the **Spark Lever** (on the left side of the steering column) by moving it all the way up. Note: Always retard the spark lever when starting. Starting the vehicle with the lever advanced (or down) can damage the starter if the engine kicks back.
- 4. Pull **Throttle Lever** (on the right side of the steering column) 1/3 down. This lever also causes the accelerator pedal on the floor to depress.
- 5. Turn **Carburetor Adjusting Rod** to the right (clockwise) until closed, then one full turn

to the left (counterclockwise) to open. If the vehicle is warm, one quarter turn open to the left will be fine.

- 6. Put **Gear Shifter** into neutral.
- 7. Turn **Key** on.
- 8. Now pull back on the **Choke Rod** (Carburetor Adjusting Rod).
- 9. Press on the **Starter Button**, located on the floor.
- After one turn, release the **Choke**. (Pulling on the choke enriches the piston chamber with a lot of gas at once, which helps to start the engine when it is cold. If the engine is warm, there is no need to use the choke.)
- 11. As soon as it starts, advance **Spark Lever** half way down the quadrant.
- Close the Carburetor Adjusting Rod to onequarter turn open.
- 13. For every 5 MPH increase in speed, you would move your Spark Advance Lever down one notch. In general, for normal driving, it is 1/2 to 3/4 of the way down. Lower it further for high speeds. When the engine is under a load, such as climbing a steep hill, retard (move up) the Spark Advance Lever.





Driving Your Model A

- 1. The Model A has just been started.
- 2. Apply the foot brake.
- 3. Release the parking brake.
- 4. Disengage the clutch (push the clutch pedal down to the floor).
- 5. Move the shift lever to the left and back for first gear.
- 6. Let up on brake pedal.
- 7. Gradually release the clutch pedal and lightly accelerate at the same time.
- 8. When the car has reached a speed of about 10 MPH, push in the clutch, shift into neutral, let the clutch out, put clutch back in, shift into second gear, and let clutch out (takes about three seconds, not rushing the count).
- 8. When the car has reached a speed of about 20 MPH, push in the clutch, shift into neutral, let the clutch out, put clutch back in, shift to third gear, and let clutch out.

Notes:

- As you get to know your Model A, the speeds for shifting may vary.
- For economical driving, reduce the quantity of gasoline in the mixture by turning the GAV adjusting rod to the right as far as possible without affecting the operation of the engine. This will increase gas mileage.
- Turning the GAV too far to the left results in a "rich mixture". Such a mixture has too much gasoline and should be used for starting and warming up

only. Running too rich a mixture causes excessive carbon and overheating. In addition it wastes fuel. (For normal driving, the GAV is 1/4 turn open.)

Double Clutch to Down Shifting

 To down shift from third gear to second gear, disengage (push in) the clutch, shift to neutral, reengage (let up) the clutch and rev the engine; then disengage the clutch again and shift to second, then re-engage the clutch. Basically "clutch, neutral, clutch, rev-clutch, shift" fairly quickly.

Stop Your Model A

- 1. Let off the gas pedal.
- 2. Depress the brake pedal.
- 3. Depress the clutch pedal.
- 4. Shift into neutral.
- 5. Release clutch pedal and brake to a halt. (Note: if you push the brake pedal all the way down and the car seems slow to stop, you may need to "pump" the brake pedal as you stop. That is, press and release the brake pedal quickly several times as you stop.

Park Your Model A

- 1. Turn off the key.
- 2. Move the gear shift lever out of neutral and into gear (any gear); if you leave it in neutral, it may roll.
- 3. Engage the emergency brake and point the front tires toward the curb if you park on a hill.
- 4. Turn off the gas.
